President's Report Annette Woods

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to you the 2018 Annual Report for AARE. 2018 has been a year of change and activity for AARE and we finish the year with a healthy membership of 805 people. We currently have a small group of members looking at ways to increase this membership, as part of moves toward securing the future of the Association and to support its strong position. The Association works within the current education context, and sustaining funds and activities into the future is something that must be carefully managed.

It has been an honour to be the President of AARE this year and I am proud of the achievements that have been made during this period. Everything that the Association achieves is built on the generosity of the many members who volunteer time and expertise, and will only continue with this support. AARE members also support and encourage partnerships with other organisations such as the universities, departments, systems and education contexts that we work within, and this is vital for all of the activities that the Association engages in throughout the year. The members who serve on the Executive Committee, those who take up other leadership positions and roles such as SIG leaders, present at symposia and workshops, serve on review panels and awards committees, review publications and conference abstracts, organise activities and sit on working parties to name but a few, do this work without asking for personal benefits. They are not paid, nor do they receive benefits or large gifts. AARE members work in ways that demonstrate that we all understand the Association is its members and the activities that members are involved in.

I am acutely aware that all of this work is conducted and expertise given during a time when education contexts are continuing to experience constraints in time and resourcing and seem to have a narrowing of priorities. Given these contextual conditions I am even more grateful to the Association members who continue to be involved in ensuring the Association activities are ongoing, and I offer my personal thanks to the many members who are actively involved. I would also like to offer a particular thanks to the Executive Committee members of 2017 and 2018 who have worked with me during my time as

President. And I wish the 2019 Executive and the new President, Debra Hayes (2019-2020) every good wish as they take forward new agendas.

The full review of the AARE Constitution begun in 2017 was completed in 2018. I'd like to thank the 2018 Secretary, Debby Cunningham for working with me so diligently on this project, and also the many others who offered advice during consultation. The last full review of the Constitution was conducted in 2007, with additional minor revisions made in 2010, 2012, 2014, and 2015. The 2018 review focused on bringing the Constitution into line with best association practice, as well as updating the Constitution to be more representative of current AARE practices. Additionally, three proposals for larger changes to the Constitutional practices of AARE resulted from the review. Members were provided with the opportunity to vote on the proposals late in 2018. The results of that vote will be made available at the AGM to be held in Sydney on Wednesday 5th December, at 5.30 pm, and members will also be made aware of the results via email and via announcements on the website.

Ongoing work related to the Association and the positioning of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander educational research within core business has continued during 2018. This work is important to the processes and achievements of the Association, and has been progressed with the goodwill and intentions of many members. Special thanks must go to Tracey Bunda, Melitta Hogarth, and Kevin Lowe as well as Martin Mills who have been instrumental in progressing this work. There have been many other supporters of this agenda, and members who have helped and advised me personally along the way. Of course the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education Research SIG members have continued to be an important initiator and sounding board for activities in this area. The end of 2018 sees the first phase of this multifaceted agenda marked with achievements toward Acknowledgement of the importance of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives in education and educational research being made, and changes to the Constitution being proposed to the membership. In 2019 work in this area will continue and I know those leading in this area will continue to strive toward really important outcomes.

The 2017 AGM represented a very active

Association with record attendance, and rigorous discussion. Two motions were made from the floor and passed by a vote of the attending members. The first asked that the Association make a public statement denouncing the current Australian policy on refuges and asylum seekers related to offshore detention. As a result of this motion being moved, a statement was crafted and members were provided with the opportunity to offer a vote of support by signing a petition supporting the statement. The statement and the list of signatories was forwarded to the leaders of the Government and the Opposition, and other relevant Ministers and Shadow Ministers. Social media was also used to spread the Association's position on these policies. More recently to respond to campaigns in the community, the statement was rewritten and updated to appear as a blog post on EduResearch Matters, and again the subject of a social media campaign.

The second motion related to a call for the Association to become involved in work to highlight issues related to casualisation of the academic workforce, research funding, and issues of time, specialisation and progression as they relate to educational research and education academic careers. A working party of those involved in putting the motion forward at the AGM has continued to work with me as President through 2018. A Special Session will be held at the same time as the 2018 Conference activities led by these members. The activities will move the work in this area to the next phase, and part of this will be to open opportunities for other members to be involved in the working party. Having worked alongside the committed academics involved in prioritising these initiatives I'd like very much to particularly thank Amy McPherson, Sophie Rudolph, Rosie Barron, Marie Brennan, Jane Kenway and Lew Zippin for their continued work in this area.

The Association made a submission to the Senate Inquiry into funding Australia's research during 2018. Being engaged in these public debates is crucial for the Association as a national education organisation and voice for educational research. As a result of the AARE submission, AARE was asked to send a representative to one of the Inquiry hearings. I attended this hearing and used the opportunity to advocate for social science and humanities research in Australia, and for an awareness of the national and international importance of educational

research and its disciplinary particularities. AARE was also quick to denounce political interference in Australia's research funding practices in a statement publicised in November. The ability of the Association to engage in these important debates has been facilitated through the communications portfolio of the Executive Committee, and a 2017 Executive Committee decision to allow the President to make statements on issues of public debate related to education in consultation with the Executive Management Team. This decision has improved the likelihood of a quick and timely response being made on important issues.

The Association continues to build strong relationships with other associations. There were large numbers of members who attended 2018 conferences of American Educational Research Association (AERA), British Education Research Association (BERA) and the European Educational Research Association (ECER), taking advantage of agreements between the Associations. The 2020 ECER Conference will be launched at the 2018 AARE Conference and we are excited by the possibilities of this partnership. Representative Invited Symposia have been presented at AERA and BERA in 2018, and a team has already been selected to represent AARE at AERA 2019 in Toronto. The 'Alliance' project between AARE, ATEA and ACDE (through cADRE) has resulted in a report that has been published on the AARE web site. This project continues to provide opportunities for the Associations to collaborate around issues related to educational research, teaching and teachers, and initial teacher education.

AARE continues its sponsorship of the Media Centre for Education Research Australia (MCERA) as a gold sponsor during 2018-2019. MCERA continues to work to support the dissemination of informed, diverse and varied research related to education. Should you wish to find out more about the benefits of being a member of AARE in relation to MCERA, please watch out for the links to the MCERA newsletter in AARE Member Updates.

During 2018 the activities of members involved in leading Strategic Initiatives projects have resulted in a number of outcomes including a series of very successful symposia on topics such as quantitative methodologies, research data, and the politics of education policy, as well as participatory symposia for teacher educators. The new timing for calls for expressions of interest for funding related to this

scheme implemented in 2017 has provided the opportunity for these activities to be undertaken throughout 2018. Discussions about the purposes of these funding rounds continue at the Executive Committee level to ensure that the allocation of funding provides important member benefits and works to the strategic purposes of the Association.

The Theory workshops have continued their tradition of providing access to research seminars which have a particular (but not exclusive) focus toward the needs of early career and post graduate researchers. Two theory workshops were organised for 2018: the first, hosted by Monash University on its Peninsular Campus, and the second supported by Sunshine Coast University and held nearby in a central place on the Coast for convenience. Theory Workshops were attended by recipients of the Alison Lee Theory in Educational Research Workshops Scholarships which offer support to assist postgraduate students and early career researchers to attend the workshops.

The ECR and PGR Executive members ran a highly successful pre-conference workshop as part of the 2017 Annual Conference, and have the final details of the upcoming 2018 pre-conference workshops organised, with an amazing line up of workshop, keynote and panel presenters planned. As is the case each year these workshops have large numbers of members and non-members registered.

The Association's Journal, The Australian Education Researcher, continues to improve in relation to submission numbers, timelines and importantly metrics, under the leadership of the Editor in Chief. The Journal has a new Editorial Team appointed for the calendar year of 2018 and this is an important way to both ensure the successful organisation of the Journal, and also to provide additional leadership roles within the Association. The Association's Book Series Local and Global Issues in Education (LGIE) will soon publish the fourth title in the series, and sales continue on all books in the series. The experienced Editorial Team has been expanded with the addition of a third Editor who we know will bring new insights to the team and the Series. This appointment was made after a very competitive nomination process. EduResearch Matters also continues to expand and readership statistics are very exciting for 2018. The Blog has published articles on issues related to important current debates, including phonics in the early

years of schooling, writing, NAPLAN, data sharing and education funding. These posts are written by a diverse range of authors, with the support of our exceptional Blog Editor, Maralyn Parker.

The Communications portfolio continues to expand our reach into social media for public comment as well as being a way to advertise the Association, its purposes and activities. A new initiative is to provide vodcasts to make comment about issues that fit with a broader community agenda. As an example, the 'Because of her we can vodcast launched during NAIDOC 2018' was highly successful attracting watches from a broad audience. After this success, there are plans for similar activities in 2019 to fit in with other community initiatives. There has been a large amount of work completed to ensure our web presence is functional and engaging and I thank the Communications Officer for her work in this regard as well.

The Association's Special Interest Groups continue to be a very important part of the activities achieved. Through 9 SIG Competitive Grants and a number of SIG Annual Funding allocations the SIGs arranged a diverse range of activities including, providing bursaries for students to attend the AARE conference, a Quantitative Research Methodology Summit and a Health and Physical Education Forum. The Association is also excited to announce a new SIG for 2018. Built on work by many over a number of years to strengthen and support connections between AARE and education policy work within systems, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to announce the new SIG Schools and Education Systems and know that this will be supported by members who work in this area.

We continued to offer a range of opportunities for awards to highly deserving recipients across a number of categories in 2017. The process for the awards to be provided in 2018 is well underway with very strong fields in all categories. Our awards are given in recognition of excellence in each category and importantly mark our focus on quality, engaging research.

In answer to calls for more support to postgraduate students and early career researchers a new scheme for conference bursaries was trialled this year. It is hoped that such initiatives might be continued with the generosity of the membership through the Lend a Hand program. The Association is also pleased to

connect with postgraduate students in the South Pacific region, and will welcome the first recipient of the South Pacific Scholarship who will attend and present their doctoral work at the 2018 AARE Conference in Sydney.

Several Executive members will complete their terms on the Executive at the end of 2018. I know you will join me in thanking these members and in wishing the new Executive members well when they join the Executive Committee at the proceedings of the Annual General Meeting.

The Sydney Conference promises to be an important event in the AARE calendar. In 2019 we will meet in Brisbane and planning for this meeting is well underway.

Finally, 2018 marks the last year in my Presidency and I want to take the opportunity to thank all members for the privilege of leading the Association over the past two years. A professional association such as AARE is the membership. I encourage you all to become involved in whatever ways you can in the activities, leadership and directions of the Association. After the 2018 AGM I will hand the President role over to the current Incoming President, Debra Hayes. I know that Debra has plans for the Association that will continue to ensure its place in the national education agenda and wish Debra and the 2019 Executive well in their pursuits. I will continue to be involved in the Association in other capacities wherever this is useful to AARE members.

Treasurer's Report

During 2017-18 AARE's financial position continued to be sound. However, as in previous years, we continued to draw on our reserves to meet all operating costs for this financial year. While the level of reserves the Association currently holds allows us to adopt this strategy, the ongoing financial sustainability for the organisation will rely heavily on the Association being able to maintain sound levels of income from membership fees, proceeds from very well run and managed conferences and other revenue producing activities.

Income from membership fees continues to be an issue that the Executive continually monitors; growth from this source of income is projected to be limited over the short term. This means that we need to continue to be vigilant in our efforts to diversify the sources of our income in order to continue to provide a wide range of member benefits and services. A Membership Working Group has been formed to explore strategies for building the financial stability of AARE including ways to increase and maintain members, diversifying the Association's income streams and minimising the short term expenditure of the Association.

For the 2017-18 financial year, AARE's major areas of expenditure were the following:

- Conducting the annual conference;
- maintaining the national office and events management for the various activities of the Association
- publishing the AER Journal;
- funding for the Special Interest Groups, both annual funding and the Competitive Grants;
- supporting researcher development through the Theory workshops and pre-conference workshops;
- providing strategic Initiatives grants; and
- continuing to build national and

international links with like-mined organisations concerned to promote and foster educational research.

Our Audited Financial Statements for 2017-2018 can be found at the end of this report and are available from the AARE website. The Balance Sheet provides a summary of the overall financial position of the Association as at 30 June 2018. Our overall equity position, while healthy, has declined relative to our position at the same time in 2017. In the past year we have drawn down \$87,941 from our reserves to fund a range of initiatives. These reserves are now approaching the equivalent of two times what we currently need to operate the Association for a year. We need to be prudent to ensure that these funds do not continue to decline to a point where we do not have a comfortable margin of funds (usually at least equivalent to the total amount of funds required to operate the Association for 12 months) available to support our work.

The Profit and Loss statement shows our income

and expenditure for the year 1 July 2017 – 30 June 2018. Membership continues to be a significant source of income as well as the surplus that we retain from the annual conference. Both of these sources of income are important if we are to sustain funding for strategic initiatives and other member benefits.

Secretary's Report

The Annual General Meeting (AGM), in which all members of the association are entitled to participate, is the main decision-making body for the association. The AARE AGM is always held in conjunction with the association's annual conference. The 2017 AGM was held at the Hotel Realm in Canberra (the conference venue) and saw the largest attendance in many years.

The AARE Executive Committee is responsible for managing the association's business between Annual General Meetings. The composition and role of the Executive are set down in the AARE Constitution.

In 2018 the AARE Executive Committee comprised 15 members – 12 elected by the general membership of AARE and three co-opted or appointed by the Executive (the CSC Chair and the two Indigenous Liaison members). Members were based at institutions and organisations in Queensland, New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria. A full list of members is provided elsewhere in this Report.

As usual, the Executive held three meetings during the past year: one over the weekend immediately before the annual conference (25-26 November 2017, at the Hotel Realm in Canberra), one early in 2018 (22-23 February, at the University of Sydney), and one mid-year (7-8 June, at QUT in Brisbane). SIG convenors were invited to join members for lunch at the pre-conference meeting to discuss emerging and ongoing SIG issues with the Executive, and many convenors took up this opportunity. The Sydney and Brisbane meetings included morning teas with Education faculty staff of the hosting universities where Executive members spoke about the role and activities of AARE. All three Executive meetings included discussions with representatives of the national Research in Education Network

(REN), with which the Executive has a mutually helpful ongoing relationship.

Throughout the year, a small management group consisting of elected office-bearers from the Executive (the President, the President Elect, the Secretary and the Treasurer) and the Office and Events Manager (AARE's sole permanent employee), teleconferenced fortnightly to oversee AARE business between Executive meetings. The CSC Chair regularly joined a part of these meetings to keep the management group apprised of conference arrangements. Other Executive members such as the Research Development Coordinator also occasionally joined a section of the meeting to report on their portfolios.

Annual returns to the Office of Consumer and Business Affairs in South Australia (where AARE is incorporated) were submitted as required, soon after the AGM, as was relevant information to ASIC (with which AARE is registered as a Registrable Australian Body).

Awards Report Iisahunter and Debra Cunningham

In the past year AARE has been proud to continue its tradition of presenting awards for excellence in research and scholarship. Honorary Life Membership Award

In 2017 Honorary Life Membership of AARE was awarded to Professor Jane Kenway for her long-term service to the association and her distinguished contributions to educational research.

Radford Lecture

One of the keynote lectures at each annual conference is traditionally named in honour of the late Dr William Radford, one of the founders of AARE and a significant player in the mid-twentieth century development of educational research in Australia. The presenter is specially invited by the AARE Executive.

The 2017 Radford Lecture was presented

by Professor Margaret Somerville. Professor Somerville's lecture, "Education research for the Anthropocene: The (micro) politics of researcher becoming", may be viewed on the AARE website.

Ray Debus Award for Doctoral Research in Education

The Australian Educational Researcher Report Nicole Mockler

The Australian Educational Researcher has continued its upward trajectory in 2018, with a growing social media profile and a continued increase in journal metrics.

As of early August, AER has received 135 new submissions to date since January 1, 2018, and in Editorial Manager there are currently 23 manuscripts under review and a further 21 out for first or second revisions. This represents a significant rise in the number of submissions to date in 2018 and suggests that we will well surpass the 167 submissions received in 2017.

The new Editorial Team, comprised of Associate Editors Drs Radhika Gorur (Deakin), Ian Hardy (UQ), Deborah Pino-Pasternak (Murdoch), Stewart Riddle (USQ), and Garth Stahl (UniSA) and Editorial Assistant Dr Meghan Stacey (USyd) have now been in place for a full calendar year, and are ably managing the increased copyflow.

AER Awards 2017

The Springer/AER Best Paper Award for 2017 was awarded to Professors Debra Hayes and Catherine Doherty for their paper 'Valuing epistemic diversity in educational research: an agenda for improving research impact and initial teacher education', published in Volume 44, Issue 2.

The Springer/AER Reviewer of the Year Award was awarded to Dr Angelique Howell from the University of Queensland.

Journal Metrics

AER's 2017 Impact Factor increased from 0.910 to 1.104, once again representing an upward trend. The 2017 Impact Factor score, calculated on the basis of citations of articles published in 2015 and 2016 in journal articles published in 2017, is once again a result of the excellent work of previous Editor in Chief Professor Linda Graham and the 2014-2016 editorial team.

Additionally, AER's Scimago Journal Rank for 2017 has placed it into the 1st Quartile for the first time since 2013, a result that also reflects the journal's upward trajectory in recent years.

Promotional Strategies and Visibility
We continue to select one article per issue (on the basis of potential interest to a broad audience) for two months free access, and this strategy, coupled with social media activity, appears to have a positive effect on the number of full paper downloads.

@AER_AARE has 1168 followers to date, and is used predominantly for the sharing of papers and

promotion of new issues of the journal as they reach publication. Associate Editor Dr Stewart Riddle maintains the AER Twitter account and Facebook Page, which to date has just over 300 followers.

A table of contents alert is sent to all AARE members via aare@aare.edu.au upon the release of each new issue.

Special Issues

The 2018 Special Issue of AER (45, 1, March) was co-edited by Dr Lenore Adie, Dr Jill Willis and Dr Fabienne Van der Kleij. Full papers within the Special Issue have been downloaded over 12500 times and cited 10 times since its publication five months ago.

One Special Issue has been commissioned for 2019, to be edited by Dr John Guenther, Dr Catherine Burgess and Associate Professor Neil Harrison. The title of this Special Issue is Aboriginal voices: Systematic reviews of research on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander education.

A further Special Issue, to be edited by Dr Sindu George, Dr Paul Swan, Professor Helen Watt, Professor Paul Richardson and Associate Professor Philip Parker, has been commissioned for 2020. This Special Issue will emerge from the quantitative methodology summit sponsored by AARE in 2018, and will be entitled Quantitative Methodology and Analysis for Survey Research in Education.

A rolling call for Special Issue proposals is now in place. Details of how to propose a Special Issue can be found on the AER page on the AARE website.

Many thanks to the Editorial Team for their outstanding work over this first full year of their tenure, steep learning curves notwithstanding! Collectively, they share my commitment to continuing to shape AER as a journal of choice for the publication of outstanding educational research, an objective that would be impossible without their dedication, and the careful and thoughtful way in which they engage in their editorial work.

Thanks also to our Editorial Board and International Advisory Board Members for their work in 2018, along with the many, many AARE members who have willingly and generously reviewed manuscripts for us.

Communications Report Aspa Baroutsis

In 2018, the Australian Association for Research in Education has expanded its public presence through the website, the education research blog, Twitter, Facebook and the You Tube channel.

AARE website

For a six-month period in 2018 (January to June), the AARE website (aare.edu.au) had approximately 70,000 visitors from 198 different countries, but predominantly from Australia, the United States, Philippines, the United Kingdom, and India. The AARE website has been redeveloped, including the AARE EduResearch Matters blog enabling the Association to present a more contemporary public presence. The website content has been streamlined and reorganised to better align with the Association's current needs.

EduResearch Matters

AARE promotes informed public debate and scholarship on education issues through the EduResearch Matters blog. Education researchers are encouraged to write opinion pieces, responses to policies, short reports on research, and short summaries of publications for the blog. EduResearch Matters publishes one post per week, or four posts a month.

For the period December 2017 to July 2018, the EduResearch Matters blog has had another very successful year. The 24 September, 2018 was the blog's most successful day this year with 6,014 views. The views have increased on average by 25% this year compared to the same month in 2017, with September 2018 being a 55% increase in views. Most of these views were referred by website search engines, and to a lesser degree by FaceBook and Twitter.

Social Media

AARE operates various social media channels to promote the work of the organisation, its members, and education research in general. There has been substantial increase in these modes of communication, demonstrated by the growth in followers of existing channels. There are now approximately:

 3,000 followers on the main Twitter account (@AustAssocResEd),

- 1,600 followers on the EduResearch Matters Twitter account (@AAREBlog), and
- 1,400 followers on the Association's
 Facebook page (@AusAssocResEd).
 In addition to the channels operated by AARE,
 numerous Special Interest Groups and the
 Australian Educational Researcher journal also run
 their own social media promotions.
 A new hashtag, #AAREhotTopics, has been created
 to enable Twitter users to easily identify some of
 the current debates in education and education
 research.

'Thinking with...' series

As part of this year's NAIDOC week celebrations, the Communications portfolio produced the first video in our 'Thinking with...' series. This short video features a number of the Association's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women researchers who share their thoughts on the theme, Because of her, we can. Conferences Standing Committee Report

TThe Annual AARE Conference in 2017 was held at the Hotel Realm in Canberra, our capital city. The conference ran between Sunday the 25th through to Thursday the 30th of November. The theme for 2017 was Education: What's politics got to do with it?, which was apt given it was the final week of parliamentary sitting. As one of our regional areas, the conference was very well attended with over 750 delegates and feedback commented on how personal and welcoming this particular conference felt for those that attended.

We were very fortunate to have a special guest at the Welcome Reception – the Honourable Linda Burney MP. Ms Burney so eloquently engaged a large group of delegates throughout the reception speaking about the issues young Indigenous people, their families and communities face today. I would like to acknowledge the critical work that the Indigenous Education Research SIG carried out in supporting Ms Burney's visit as well as the content throughout the entire conference program.

Our keynote speakers addressed pertinent topics

related to the politics of education including: our international keynote speaker, Professor Yvette Taylor from the University of Glasgow on gender and ethics, Associate Professor Nerida Blair on Indigenous knowledges and participation, and Professor Greg Noble on diversity, society and schooling. All keynote speeches were well received. Professor Margaret Somerville presented the Radford Lecture which provided some insightful, careful thought into early education and sustainability. Thank you to these participants for their contribution to the 2017 conference. The Conferences Standing Committee (CSC) worked tirelessly in their various roles to ensure the success of the conference including: Ms Deborah Cracknell – AARE Office and Events Manager; Ms Debra Cunningham – AARE Executive Management Team Representative; Professor Tracey Bunda and Ms Melitta Hogarth - Indigenous Research and Engagement; Professor Mary Lou Rasmussen -Special Interest Group (SIG) Coordinator; Dr Abbey MacDonald – Early Career Researcher Member; Michele Jeffries - Postgraduate Student Member; Professor Michele Simons (Treasurer); and Dr Bernadette Walker Gibbs (Awards Coordinator). We are also very fortunate to have Dorothy Hoddinott, an acclaimed principal attend our official welcome. Thank you to the Indigenous Education Research SIG once again for their help and support in making this conference rich and

diverse with a range of activities and speakers. With over 1000 submissions we are hopeful this will be a positive conference for AARE and its members.

The feedback from the 2017 Canberra conference was very positive. We have endeavoured to address feedback from previous conferences in relation to catering, waste and collegiality and we do hope that people were able to notice some of the changes we made. These include, but are not limited to: opting in or out for the conference satchels and handbooks; inviting Oz Harvest to collect any leftover food for those in need in the community; and encouraging engagement with our international visitors through the SIGs. We have also aimed to keep the overall costs for attending the conference the same and opened up day registrations for those who find it extremely difficult to attend the entire time. We are also able to offer a number of bursaries that will cover registration costs for Early Career Researchers and Post-Graduate candidates to attend. Additionally, a range of accommodation options for delegates are available including shared accommodation. We value members' feedback and encourage people to support us in improving practices each year.

I thank the Conference Standing Committee and the AARE Executive for their continued support in my role as Conference Chair. I would particularly like to thank Deb Cracknell for her endless support and collaboration.

Postgraduate Student and Early Career Researcher Report Michelle Jeffries(PGS) and Dr Amanda Heffernan (ECR)

The ECR and Postgraduate Student Representatives have continued to work towards a variety of initiatives that will address member needs or concerns.

Representatives

In 2018, Dr Amanda Heffernan took up the two-year role of Early Career Researcher (ECR) Representative (2018-2019) on the AARE Executive, taking over from Dr Abbey MacDonald whose two year position concluded in December 2017. We thank Dr MacDonald for her service and commitment to ECRs. The ECR Representative worked alongside Michelle Jeffries, the Postgraduate Student

Representative, who completes her two-year (2017-2018) position at the conclusion of the Sydney AARE 2018 Conference in December, 2018. We are continuing to strengthen handover methods to ensure consistency in representation for Postgraduate Students and ECRs and streamline processes where needed.

Pre-Conference Workshops

The annual ECR/PGS Pre-Conference was held in Canberra on 26 November, 2017. The content included advice on applying for grants, networking, peer reviews/reviewing; building a media plan and expanding methodologies/approaches to research. A new "panel" session was introduced to these workshops, providing opportunities to hear from experienced academics and ECRs about navigating the academic landscape post-PhD and to ask questions. The conference was scored highly by attendees, with a survey of attendees scoring the Pre-Conference at an average 4.3 out of 5 (with 1 being poor and 5 being excellent). Participants also provided feedback which was taken forward into the planning for the 2018 Pre-Conference, including an increase in opportunities to establish and develop networks with each other. The 2018 Preconference workshop program has been a major focal point of our service during the first half of 2018.

Communication with Members

A social media presence has continued to be a priority this year. Facebook members have continued to grow and a Twitter page was created (which now has 203 followers). These pages aim to keep ECRs and PGS abreast of relevant information, such as AARE workshops, promoting AARE activities and opportunities, employment and scholarship opportunities, and sharing relevant information/ articles. Relevant news continues to be sent via a ECR/PGS email list also. This variety of ways of keeping in touch provides accessibility and flexibility to members and ensures timely and wide dissemination of important information. Supporting Postgraduate Students and ECRs in **Insecure Employment Conditions**

This year, a number of new initiatives have been introduced in order to support unwaged/partwaged PGS/ECR members in attending the annual conference. A number of bursaries have been provided for this year's conference. In addition, we have focused on ensuring that members are aware of other financial support such as Alison Lee Theory Workshop Scholarships and the annual paper awards. We are also working with members of the Working Group investigating the current and future research climate, sharing our members' feedback on issues affecting ECR and PGS researchers.

Looking Forward

Future plans include the possibility of developing vodcasts or podcasts that feature members and their research, or that provide snapshots of theory or method in useful introductory packages.

We continue to investigate possibilities of doing this sustainably over time.

Research Development Report Allyson Holbrook

AARE continues to collaborate with the Research in Education Network (REN), which includes members from all state, Independent and Catholic education departments. In 2018 we continued to work with REN colleagues to keep informed of national research priorities, ethics, consent issues.

Details of this collaboration include:

- AARE hosting the National Application Form and the National Research Repository on its' website. We look forward to improved access with changes made to the AARE website.
- AARE providing an opportunity for REN to present a Symposium at the 2017 and 2018 AARE Conference.
- REN leaders have been successful in proposing a new SIG to join our suite of AARE SIGS. Entitled Schools and Education Systems the SIG promises to be an exciting space for research work related to educators in schools and early childhood education contexts.
